

### Pastor's Perspective

As we head into the summer months, the Cross of Christ mission trip to Tanzania is moving up my priority and planning list. In July I'll be joining 20 others traveling to Africa for what will be Cross of Christ's third mission trip in support of the MaaSAE Girls School in Monduli in north-central Tanzania, as well as churches, health centers and missionaries in that area.

I'm excited for this opportunity for several reasons. First, my family and I will be returning to Africa for the first time in about 19 years, since our time with the Christian relief and development organization Food for the Hungry in the 1990s. For our son David, he'll be returning "home" to Africa, where he spent his infant and toddler time. We're excited to show him places he only knows through stories and photographs of this early years.

Second, previous Tanzania Mission trips have been highly impactful for the Cross of Christ members who were part of the previous groups as well as the congregation as a whole. That you were already so supportive of this work was one of the things that attracted me to Cross of Christ when I was open for call. Mission is what we do everywhere outside of the church doors, from across the street to across the globe. Yet I knew that your investment in Africa through triannual mission trips meant that a foundation for being missional had already been established in this congregation. I'm looking forward to sharing this experience not only with my teammates but with the whole church.

I've taken some pretty cool summer trips over the years, to national parks and beach communities and baseball stadiums. I have no doubt that this will be one of the most impactful and memorable summer journeys I'll ever experience. Thank you for supporting our mission partners and friends in Tanzania, for you awesome financial and prayer support of Cross of Christ's mission trips, and for allowing me this tremendous opportunity to be a part of this spiritual pilgrimage and mission. ## Youth News

I'm writing this while listening to a version of a song in our hymnal. Now before you pop off with "Kristie's such a [insert your adjective of choice] that she listens to hymns when she's not in church," hear me out. A song about revolution and change, "Canticle of the Turning" is actually a relatively "new" (in church terms) addition to our hymnal, as it was "only" written in 1990. Yes, dinosaur years compared to when many of you were born, but a little newer than something like "A Mighty Fortress is Our God," coming to you soon in VH1's "I Love the 1520s" collection. (I'm not picking on Uncle Marty--we've kept that song around for a reason!)

Anyway, before I digress too much, I do have a point. "Canticle of the Turning" is a riff on "The Magnificat," which is also known as "Mary's Song" (some of you sang that in Adoramus many years ago, yes?) and is Jesus' mother rejoicing over the gift that would be Jesus, but also about how God has shaken, is shaking, and will shake up the status quo more than a little bit. That's where the revolution thing comes from. But it was particularly in my mind (hence the reason I'm listening to this particular song) because as I write this I'm thinking about May moving into June and how that will cause a shake up--a turning, if you will--in the lives of many of you. Your turning may mean leaving your grade, your school, the state, or even the country, and however small it might seem in the grand scheme of things, it's a shake up of your status quo.

So know that I'm thinking about you as we come into this season of turning. We have one big turning event coming up--Affirmation of Baptism Sunday on May 15. Please come and support your peers making the commitment that some of you have made already and some of you are preparing to make: to "...live among God's faithful people; hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper; proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed; serve all people following the example of Jesus; and strive for justice and peace in all the earth." And while many of you have a few years before you're legally adults, affirming your baptism (AKA, "being confirmed") means that you're an adult in the eyes of the church. While that doesn't let you vote for U.S. president this year, it does mean that you could vote for our congregational president next year!

Another --slightly less formal-- turning event will be in June, with our annual end-of-year bonfire out back! Come burn your old homework, AP class notes, and anything else you'd prefer not to have to look at again (as long as it's yours-no school property please!) and we'll roast marshmallows, hot dogs, and cheese sticks over the charred remains. Bring friends, because really, it'll be like group therapy. :-) And lastly, on May 8, we'll once again be serving dinner to our guests, the men from Congregations for the Homeless who will be sharing our building for the month of May. That actually also goes with the theme of the song I mentioned above; a line from one verse goes "The hungry poor shall weep no more, for the food they can never earn; There are tables spread, ev'ry mouth be fed, for the world is about to turn." ## **Meeting Jesus**

Where did I see Jesus in Tanzania? During my trip to Tanzania with the 2012 Mission Team I saw Jesus in many places. The girls at the MasSae Girls Lutheran Secondary School had an amazing faith. And that is where I saw Jesus. The girls come to Chapel early in the day before going to classes. I saw Jesus in their faces as they sang hymns with eagerness and joy. Their beautiful voices still resonate in my memory. In conversations with them I was amazed at how easily they spoke of their love of Jesus.

I saw Jesus when we visited the Plaster House where children were recovering from operations to straighten their legs and feet crippled by the effects of too much fluoride in the water which displaces the calcium in the bones causing them to be too soft. They must stay at the Plaster House for months until their casts can be safely removed before going home. These children were happily and cheerfully hobbling around, grateful to be able to walk again. I saw Jesus in Sara, the wonderful woman who started Plaster House, and in her assistants, who provide loving care for these children.



I saw Jesus at the pre-school and orphanage for AIDS orphans, Tamahira, started by a young man named Crispin who himself was an AIDS orphan. He takes little children off the streets where they are begging, and gives them food, clothing, shelter and medical treatment for HIV. He gives them a basic early education (in English) -- counting, alphabet, writing et cetera. In Crispin and his work, I saw Jesus.



I saw Jesus in the churches the Massai have painstakingly built from very meager resources. Sometimes the church is little more than a stick and mud hut, but Jesus is alive there. Our donations have helped put roofs on and walls up, but their faith has built these churches.

Each Saturday during the month of April Cross of Christ had the opportunity to host Outdoors for All. The mission of Outdoors for All Foundation program is to transforms lives through outdoor recreation. It was founded in 1979 in the Pacific Northwest. ## Congregations for the Homeless

Each May Cross of Christ hosts the Congregations for the Homeless Men's Shelter. We work with our Covenant Partners, St Louis Parish, Church of the Resurrection, and Temple B'nai Torah to provide meals and volunteers for the shelter. This is a yearround shelter program that moves between several congregations on the Eastside. It operates from 7pm until 7 am every day of the year and accepts homeless men 18 years and older who have a connection to the Eastside. The shelter provides:

- · A safe warm place to sleep
- Three meals a day
- Storage for belongings
- Case Management
- Medical and dental services
- · Job assistance
- Training to prepare for housing
- Bus passes
- Showers
- Laundry facilities
- Haircuts

The intake process begins with a conversation by phone. In accordance with the CFH philosophy of helping men who want to move themselves out of homelessness, they use the following intake criteria:

- Must have a current state picture I.D.
- Must allow CFH to run a criminal background check. Anyone with a sex offense crime cannot be a member of the shelter.
- Must be willing to be drug- and alcohol-free, and willing to address any addiction issues.
- Must be willing to work one-on-one with a Case Manager
