There will be Reformation inspired music and games for all ages, as well as a raffle with fun Reformation and Lutheran themed prizes.

Reformation Anniversary FAQ's

Who was Martin Luther?



Martin Luther was a Catholic monk and priest living in Wittenberg, Germany, in the early 1500s. When he began questioning the church teaching that was used to justify selling indulgences, a fierce controversy began over the church's teachings on forgiveness,

grace and faith; the content of preaching; and the church's ministry. Luther was eventually excommunicated from the church and outlawed by civilauthorities, but his witness of God's forgiving mercy in Christ found many supporters.

What happened on Oct. 31, 1517?

On this date Luther sent a letter to the Catholic archbishop of Mainz that urged renewed preaching of "the gospel and the love of Christ" instead of continued promotion of indulgences (payment for reducing the amount of punishment one has to undergo for sin), which had "silenced" gospel preaching. He did not choose the day at random. Church representatives were actively marketing indulgences in a neighboring area, and the next day, All Saints Day, was a church festival associated with the church's teaching on merits, which was used to promote the selling of indulgences. He also enclosed a copy of his

"Ninety-Five Theses," which were also posted on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg that same day, in Latin, as an invitation to theological and scholarly debate.

Why was this action important?

Martin Luther believed that God's mercy could not be bought or earned, but only received by faith, thereby setting an individual free from a life of others' judgment. It was this message of freedom he wanted people to understand not only to remove the paralyzing fear and judgement they lived under from the Roman Catholic church, but also to live with joy, hope and confidence. Furthermore, in this freedom one's faith is a mighty, active presence, that inspires a living, daring confidence thereby liberating oneself to contribute to the common good.

Why is this still relevant today?

All of us continue to live in a culture where judgment, guilt and shame are everyday experiences and where bullying words, abusive actions and shaming public discourse permeate our lives. The indulgences controversy may be a relic of the past, but the healing and reconciling message of God's mercy and forgiveness in Christ that Luther and others served is still needed – and still surprisingly contested.

Five Concert Series 7pm in the Sanctuary Beginning September 27

From the beginning of the Reformation, Martin Luther had a significant impact on church and society through his contributions to sacred music. His intention to spread the gospel among the people through song achieved its manifold purpose. This remains true not only for his own time but for the following centuries up to the present day, all over the world. Other poets, contemporaries and descendants alike, were inspired by Luther's songs and composed their own hymns.

Luther's lifelong love of music was accompanied by an in-depth musical education. He knew secular and sacred songs from an early age, played the lute well, and sang in the convent when he was a monk, as a husband and father with his family, and as a professor with his students. Music was an indispensable part of his life.

The incorporation and promotion of music in the schoolroom resulted in a close relationship between church and school, as well as between classrooms and religious services. Pupils took part through chanting at services, and the evangelical hymns in the chantry were spread through the choir's chanting books. Numerous musical prints originated in Georg Rhau's printing shop in Wittenberg that carried the Protestant repertoire into the world. From central Germany, starting in Saxony and Thuringia, the Protestant musical culture covered all of evangelical Germany and later shaped Protestant musical culture. In addition to choir-related music, it cultivated the musical rendering of biblical texts.

Heinrich Schütz and Johann Sebastian Bach are the finest representatives of this specific Protestant musical culture. In addition, the culture of the organ, first cultivated in northern Germany, became widespread. One of several masters of the organ was Dieterich Buxtehude (c. 1637–1707), who established evening concerts in Lübeck, which in turn served as precursors to the bourgeois musical culture.

Luther's approach to music is formed through the conviction that music is a particularly beautiful and unique offering of the divine creation. Music moves human hearts and allows them to anticipate the heavens. To bring people joy and to praise the Lord is music's true task and, indeed, its service.

Join us this season as we journey toward and celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation with a series of evening concerts. For five Wednesdays we will present a concert/ recital meant to enliven the spirit and offer praise to God. These events will begin on September 27th and take place at 7pm. All are welcome.

After a thorough search and interview process, Pastor Judy Brennan has been offered and has accepted the newly created position of Coordinator of Caring Ministries. (See Pastor Judy's introductory article to learn more about our newest partner in ministry.)

The Search and Interview Team as well as the Personnel Committee and Council were impressed by Pastor Judy's thoughtful, calm, and relaxed presence, her background as a parish pastor, her clearly expressed passion for relational ministry, her well-rounded background, and her creativity and energy.

We are grateful that the Lord has brought us together at the right time in the life of Cross of Christ as well as in Pastor Judy's life! Pastor Judy will be working with our already strong lay Caring Ministry leaders and volunteers to provide deeper and wider care for our members in need, including members who are homebound long-term or temporarily, in hospital or rehab centers, under hospice care, facing crisis, and in other times of need. She will be working with Lay Visitors, Prayer Chain members, Caring Card Team members, Meals and Transportation Care Teams, and others to share the love of Christ in important ways.

Working on a one-quarter time basis (average of 10 hours weekly) Pastor Judy will partner with Pastor Dave to provide pastoral care, emergency responses, and pastoral guidance. She will spend most of her time outside of the church office visiting folks, but will establish regular office hours yet to be determined. She will also be with us in worship approximately one Sunday a month, including preaching and presiding a few times each year when possible to cover Pastor Dave's vacation time.

Pastor Judy officially joins our staff on Tuesday, September 5. She will be officially installed in both worship services on Sunday, September 24. She's excited to get to know us, and we are looking forward to working with her!

Hello! I'm really looking forward to coming on board at Cross of Christ and getting to know you better. Here's a little about me: 1'm originally from St. Paul, Minnesota, but graduated high school in Winthrop, Minnesota. I went to St. Olaf for a year, but graduated from Wartburg College, Waverly, Iowa in 1997 and Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary, Berkeley, Californía in 2004.
