You've heard the weather expression "wintry mix"? According the weather.com, wintry mix is variable precipitation consisting of rain, freezing rain, sleet, and/or snow. In layman's terms, it's the yuckiest kind of winter weather – cold, slushy, nasty, stuff.

Wintry mix also describes how I feel sometimes about the season we're heading into. There's a lot I look forward to this time of year. Many special services and seasons like All Saints' Day, Thanksgiving Eve, Christ the King Sunday, Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany are among my favorite worship experiences of the whole year. But they take place when the natural season of winter brings more clouds, rain, and darkness, especially here in the Pacific Northwest. It's a fun and festive time, both pastorally and personally for me. But it's also one of my busiest seasons, with seemingly too many to-do's than I can get done. Wintry mix!

Are you looking forward to winter? Do you enter it with excitement and anticipation, or with melancholy or even dread? Like me, do you have mixed feelings as we turn the calendar to November, December, and then to the New Year?

It doesn't even have to be winter outside for us to experience a wintry mix emotionally, or spiritually. Life can be filled with both dark and light, joy and sadness, hope and fears – sometimes

falling upon us all at once. Life can be a mix, and we can feel all mixed up, any time of the year.

It was into the darkness of the world, and the darkness that enters into each of our lives from time to time, that Jesus came to humanity as a human, as the Christ Child. He came to be one of us. He came to be with us. And he came to show us and to tell us that God is for us, not against us. Even and especially when we experience wintry mix.

Immanuel. God with us. The promise of Advent and Christmas, revealed throughout Epiphany, is that the Light of the World not only doesn't shy away from our darkness, he enters into it with the brightness and beauty of grace lived out in the One who doesn't condemn but comforts, the One who doesn't shame but saves and sets us free.

I'll be honest. While I can appreciate the magical beautify of freshly fallen snow, and I occasionally do dream of a white Christmas, as far as the actual winter weather is concerned, I'm perfectly happy to live on the mild side in the months ahead. I can do without any wintry mix at all. But come what may, my prayer for myself and for you is that we are aware of the Light that is with us always - winter, spring, summer and fall.

Now, I better go find my snow shovel, ice scraper, and boots. Just in case!

### The Blessings of Fog

When we moved to the Bellevue/Seattle area five and a half years ago, people joked all the time about getting ready for the rain. Sure enough, as summer turned into fall, the temperatures started to drop and the clouds slowly drifted in – and down. Of course there were some beautifully crisp, clear fall days, but as fall moved into winter there was less sun and more days of overcast, drizzle, sprinkles, intermittent showers, and even downpours. If the natives of Alaska have 100 words for snow, then I'm sure the natives of the PNW had 100 words for rain.



When you live in a place with so many varieties of clouds and rain, I suppose you get to be sort of an aficionado. And it's not that I don't like the sun. But I have grown to appreciate the different kinds of cloudy/rainy days. So, I have to say, my favorite kind of cloudy weather is fog.

I've lived in many places with fog, but I remember very fondly some of my first foggy experiences out here. The clouds blurring and softening the edges of great Douglas Firs and Western Red Cedars, the mysterious quiet that settled over our neighborhood, and the way everyone seemed to move slower and more carefully. It seems like fog causes us to pay more attention to our immediate surroundings and appreciate the beauty of what was near and close. In the fog, there are no long-range vistas and mountain grandeur. They may still be there, but they're hidden for now and so our focus changes. One can choose to embrace one's limitations in the fog or be frustrated by them. And so, it seems there's a kind of spiritual discipline in the fog – a challenge to adapt and be patient, to slow our pace, and to use our other, less dominate senses.

I know that as fall changes into winter, we will be moving into a time of clouds, shade, and darkness. This can be a hard time for some of us. We often look for ways to celebrate the lights that illumine these darker times, and that is good. But I would also remind and encourage us to find ways to notice the gradations and even the beauty of gray. If our eyes can't see far, then let them rest on things that are near and dear. If we are forced to slow down, then let us notice the small, quiet things that are often ignored. The fog can be a gift to us, a challenge perhaps, but also an opportunity. **Sunday, December 23** – Fourth Sunday in Advent, 2 services, Traditional 9 am and Mosaic at 11 am


**Monday, December 24** – Christmas Eve – 3 services. A family-friendly, casual service at **5 pm** with favorite Christmas Carols and a message



### New Adult Faith Formation Series on Acts Begins November 4



# From the Garden of Remembrance Committee

Your Garden of Remembrance and Columbarium are ready to serve. We have sold six niches in the new walls added last

year, and three or four niches are still currently available on upper rows of the original wall. The niches are \$2,500. This includes perpetual care, urn, engraving of the front face plate, and care should something change with the property at Cross of Christ. The costs at Quiring, our engraver, have increased over the past two years and the committee is discussing a gradual price increase, a decision will be before the end of this year to be effective early next year. Also, we are looking at special features that may be included or added to a present columbarium niche such as face plates to hold a small vase or memorial.



The Remembrance Wall also has space and is ready to serve with your special message remembering family, friends, someone special, or a special event. The costs for adding messages to this wall are \$500 for the smaller size and \$750 for the larger space. You can also purchase several spaces together.

The staff had a great time on our annual retreat. We were blessed with a good weather at Ocean Shores and with the opportunity to get to know each other closely; some of us enjoyed walking


on the beach, others taking self-care and caring for each other (hair c o l o r , m a s s a g e s , facials and so on).

## The "Endowment Fund" at Cross of Christ

This is the third in a series of articles about your Endowment Fund. The purpose of the articles is to give every member a broader understanding of the Fund and how it fits into and supports the mission of the Church. Today, we discuss "Fund Investment."

Funds are conservatively invested toward the goal of maintaining principle and generating earnings. It is the earnings from the invested principle that becomes the ongoing stream of support for the church. The amount and value of the income stream is dependent on the dollars of principle invested, the instruments in which the principle is invested, and trends of the financial markets.

Over the years the Fund has managed to grow, thanks to the gifting from members and careful investment decisions. At the end of year 2017, the asset value of the Fund totaled \$634,511. 2017 was an outstanding growth period for financial markets and your Fund participated in this growth. End of year 2017 value reflected a growth of more than 10% over end of year 2016. It would be wonderful if such growth would continue, but that's not being realistic. Financial Markets bounce up and down and the reason that Financial Analysts always end their buy, sell or hold recommendations, with the words "past performances is no guaranty of future results."

Investing decisions are made by the Board at its scheduled meetings. The Funds Balance Sheet and Income & Expense statements, as prepared and maintained by our Financial Secretary Doug Rodgers, are reviewed. After discussion and review we make our decisions to sell, hold, or buy selected investments. Jay Marsh, Financial Advisor, contributes in these decisions.

The Fund's investments reflect a mix of Bonds, broad market EFT's, CD's, and money markets.

Decisions regarding request's for distribution of funds are also considered at this time.

In the next article we'll talk about the Fund's "distributions of earnings" and how it supports the Cross of Christ. That article will be published in the spring issue of CrossCurrents. By then you will have evaluated any impact the new Federal Income Tax Law may have on your end-of-year gifting decisions. As you close out the year, a charitable gift to the Endowment Fund from your accumulated resources may hold a financial benefit for you and certainly be of great benefit to your church.
